CONWAY HIGH SCHOOL ORCHESTRA

<u>PURPOSE</u>: to develop personal and ensemble performing, listening, and musical skills at advanced levels. Class emphasis is on individual technique as well as ensemble playing. String and full orchestra literature of many styles will be rehearsed and performed. Various materials will be used to improve technique, including technical exercises and scales. Student advancement will be demonstrated and assessed through individual progress and required performances.

INSTRUMENT TECHNIQUE:

- Left and right hand coordination
- Finger dexterity through the use of scales and etudes
- "Fingerboard geography" (instrument positions) and shifting
- Vibrato
- A wide repertoire of bow strokes and when to use them appropriately
- Principles of sound production

MUSIC APPRECIATION & EXPRESSION:

- A wide variety of repertoire
- Stylistic performance of repertoire
- Music in historical and cultural context
- Music in relation to the students' lives and experiences
- Performing with phrasing and musical expression
- Proper audience and stage etiquette
- Objective evaluation and constructive criticism of performances

ESSENTIAL MUSICAL SKILLS:

- Musical symbols and their functions
- Accurate sight-reading of notes and rhythms
- Visual and aural recognition of pitch, intervals, and tonality
- Elements of music (rhythm, melody, harmony, dynamics, timbre, texture)
- Playing in tune
- Playing alone and with others
- Individual practice techniques

PROFESSIONAL SKILLS:

- Proper social and job etiquette
- Professional work ethic
- Problem-solving strategies
- Musician health and the prevention of performancerelated injuries
- Managing performance anxiety
- Teamwork, self-discipline, time management, and confidence
- Balancing commitments and responsibilities

PHILOSOPHY: The orchestra program emphasizes the importance of QUALITY WORK, PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY, and TEAM-MINDEDNESS. The orchestra provides an enjoyable learning environment where students can develop skills that are necessary to become competent and independent musicians. To contribute to the success of the group, orchestra students experience a professional environment in an educational setting. The director immerses the students in practices, protocol, and etiquette identical to those followed by professional orchestras to drive learning, stage presence, and performance standards to the highest level. Students continue to develop their knowledge of music theory and music history to further their understanding of the music they perform as facets of becoming a "whole musician."

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS

All rules and regulations contained in the Conway Public Schools student handbook apply to ALL orchestra students during ALL orchestra activities.

- Respect all people and things in the music complex. Any adult in the music complex is to be treated as in charge.
- Other instruments are off-limits, including percussion and pianos.
- Food and drink are not allowed in the music complex. Storage areas should be kept neat and free of trash.
- Students are expected to supply their own instruments (except bass players) and to purchase method books, orchestra t-shirts, and instrument accessories as needed.
- Students are strongly encouraged to upgrade the quality of their instruments, strings, and bows if they have not already, to allow them to achieve more nuance in tone quality and technique that only a finer instrument can provide.
- **Fingernails** should be trimmed so that the pad of the fingertip can easily make contact with the string. This is necessary to facilitate playing in tune. Students whose fingernails are not kept at an appropriate length will lose points off their grade and may be prevented from participating in class or performances until the student returns with an appropriate fingernail length.

ORCHESTRA PROCEDURES

<u>ATTENDANCE</u>: Absences, tardies, and credit for late and make-up assignments will be handled as stated in the school handbook. Attendance at all concerts and after-school rehearsals is required and will be reflected in the student's grade.

<u>CLASSROOM PROCEDURES</u>: Students should be ready at their seat with their instrument, music, and a pencil by the time designated by their teacher. They should tune and warm up in your seats until it is time to begin rehearsal. At the end of the period, students should loosen bows, pack instruments, and put music and instruments in the proper storage spaces. Inappropriate treatment of school instruments will result in forfeiture of use.

INSTRUMENT STORAGE: The orchestra room will be unlocked and supervised before and after school for students to drop off and pick up instruments. Storage rooms are not for keeping personal items. The storage room is not a social meeting place. Students will be assigned a storage locker or slot on a storage rack. The school will provide a combination lock for those who would like to use one. A lost lock is subject to a \$10 fee. Lockers are subject to search at any time and without warning, and should be kept clean and free of trash. Students who do not adhere to these guidelines may forfeit their use of the locker. DO NOT LEAVE YOUR INSTRUMENT IN THE CAR!!

While every attempt is made to ensure the safety of students' personal belongings, the music complex is a high traffic area. Expensive instruments and personal belongings should always be left in designated spaces. Items left unattended or not stored correctly sadly may be tampered with, with little to no recourse in finding the responsible party.

<u>ORCHESTRA SUPPLIES</u>: Each student should have the following items at their seat daily: BINDER and MUSIC (provided by the orchestra), PENCIL, ROSIN and a SOFT CLOTH, SHOULDER REST (violinists and violists) or ENDPIN STOP (cellists and bassists). At home, students should have a MUSIC STAND, METRONOME/TUNER or app, and a DEVICE for recording (phone, tablet, Chromebook, etc.).

DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

Music is an integral part of expression and identity in every culture and throughout every age. We believe music serves to enrich, inspire, and connect us all. The Conway Public Schools Orchestra program strives to be a safe and inclusive place for those from all backgrounds by celebrating the visible and invisible qualities that make each person unique: race, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, ability, family background, socioeconomic status, national origin, and other identities. Our orchestra is composed of individual instruments, each with their own unique voices and roles in the ensemble, and it is only when those individual voices are blended together in unity that we can experience music. So it is with each member of our orchestra: the more we embrace the diversity of each of our students' backgrounds, the more deeply we can understand those traits that unite us all as human beings.

FINANCIAL COMMITMENT

While there is no fee to be a member of the orchestra program, there are several required items in order to participate. These include method books; supplies such as rosin, shoulder rests, or endpin stops; orchestra t-shirts; and miscellaneous other expenses. Repairs, including broken strings, are at the expense of the student. A limited number of school-owned instruments are available for students to rent, and priority is given to families that have a legitimate financial need. Supplies,

t-shirts, and school-owned instruments will not be distributed until forms have been received and items paid in full. Families with extenuating financial circumstances should contact their child's orchestra director to work out alternative payment arrangements.

SCHOLASTIC ELIGIBILITY

Scholastic eligibility for participation in orchestra events will be consistent with the current Arkansas Activities Association (AAA) Guidelines. All 10th, 11th & 12th graders must pass (4) courses and have a 2.0 GPA. If they pass four courses but don't have a 2.0 GPA they must attend SIP classes. Info on this class will come out shortly after the beginning of the year. If a student misses a class they automatically become ineligible. In addition, students must not have any unexcused absences or disciplinary action that results in suspension. No ineligible student will be permitted to participate in interscholastic orchestra events. Ineligibility will also prevent a student from receiving an award and from traveling with the orchestra to out-of-state performances.

STUDENTS MUST MAINTAIN A PASSING GRADE IN ORCHESTRA EACH SEMESTER IN ORDER TO CONTINUE ENROLLMENT IN THE PROGRAM. A STUDENT WHO FAILS A SEMESTER OF ORCHESTRA WILL NOT BE PERMITTED TO RETURN.

GRADING POLICIES

Orchestra will be recorded on your permanent records as academic credit. This is a performance-based class, and performance and progress in class are the primary areas in which students will be assessed. <u>Students are expected to practice at home to reinforce concepts presented in class</u>. How much practice is dependent on the student's ability level and focus during their practice time. By the high school level, students should be good managers of their practice time and know how to plan and problem-solve during a practice session. Students' grades are made up of the following components:

- PROFESSIONAL DEMEANOR: Personal responsibility and teamwork are very important in an orchestra, just as it is in a community or society. For this reason, it will also be counted as part of the student's grade. A musician's positive attitude, preparedness for rehearsals, and participation (professional demeanor) is very important in order to have an orchestra that will excel and grow in quality throughout the year. A STUDENT WITHOUT AN INSTRUMENT OR MUSIC IN CLASS WILL LOSE POINTS FROM THEIR GRADE FOR EACH INFRACTION.
- <u>PLAYING ASSESSMENTS</u>: Students will be expected to play by themselves periodically during each quarter for assessment and/or seating. Playing exams may contain excerpts from the literature, technique books, scales, or rhythm patterns and may be live or recorded by video or audio. Observed performance during class (correct notes, style, bowing, etc.) will also be considered.
- <u>OTHER ASSIGNMENTS</u>: Traditional "pencil and paper" or electronic assignments may be given to supplement instruction, including practice planners. Students should follow the teacher's instructions on completing and turning these in. Credit for late and make-up assignments will be handled as stated in the school handbook.
- SYMPHONIC ORCHESTRA AFTER-SCHOOL REHEARSALS: Mandatory after-school rehearsals will take place in the weeks leading up to the Symphonic Orchestra Concert. See the calendar at the beginning of this parent guide for those dates. Students should make arrangements in advance to avoid conflicts with other activities. Failure to attend these after-school rehearsals will affect a student's grade and seating. Requests for excused absences due to legitimate school-related conflicts must be submitted IN WRITING and APPROVED by the director prior to the rehearsal. Excused absences will be considered on an individual basis. After-school jobs are not a valid excused absence.
- CONCERT PREPARATION AND PERFORMANCE: Concerts are a required part of a student's grade. They are not only an opportunity for the students and teachers to evaluate musical progress, but they also serve as a common performance goal and let the students share the music with their families and friends. Just as a member of the football team is expected to play at every game, members of the orchestra are expected to follow through with this commitment to the ensemble.

The performance calendar is on the front page of this parent guide. *Please post these dates on your calendar*. School activity conflicts will be handled on an individual basis and should be worked out prior to the concert. Parents should contact the orchestra director <u>before the concert</u> in the event of illness or emergency. **Unexcused absences will result in a zero for the concert grade**. Grades will also be adjusted for the following infractions: tardiness, uniform violations, forgotten music, forgotten instrument, and unprofessional behavior.

CONCERT ATTIRE

Uniform concert dress is very important to the professional appearance of the orchestra. At the current time, the uniform code does not require identical dresses or jackets. To keep this flexibility, students should follow concert dress guidelines closely. Grades will be adjusted for students out of uniform (see grading procedures). If you have any problems purchasing uniforms, please inform an orchestra director immediately. If your child was enrolled in high school orchestra last year and already has a formal uniform, please check now to see that everything still fits. Don't wait until the night of the concert to find out if pants are long enough!!

INFORMAL/CASUAL CONCERT DRESS

Conway High School Orchestra T-Shirt and blue jeans. The CHS Orchestra has its own t-shirt design: students new to the CHS Orchestra program will need to purchase one. Returning students: please make sure your shirt still fits and looks good!

FORMAL CONCERT DRESS

OPTION 1: TUXEDO

- Black tuxedo jacket; white pleated tuxedo shirt; black cummerbund; solid black bow tie; black tuxedo pants with stripe), black dress socks, black dress shoes. No tailcoats or sport coats, and no plain black dress pants.
- ** This option is being phased out. The 2023-2024 school year will be the last year for this option.

OPTION 2: FORMAL BLACK

- ON TOP: Black dress top/shirt with full-length sleeves. Collared shirts must be worn with a solid black bowtie or long black necktie. Dressy black wraps, sport coats, jackets, or sweaters are optional. No sleeveless, spaghetti straps, strapless, or backless dresses or tops.
- ON BOTTOM: Long black dress pants or skirts. Must be at least ankle-length when seated. No leggings, jeans, or sweatpants.
- FOOTWEAR: Black close-toed dress shoes with black dress socks or hose. No athletic shoes or open toes.

FOR ALL STUDENTS: Long hair should be pulled back or up so that students can see their conductor, and their audience can see their faces. No flashy or distracting jewelry. No hats. Midriff must be covered front and back when playing.

FUNDRAISING

"LA FIESTA ORQUESTA" TACO SUPPER: The annual "La Fiesta Orquesta" Taco Supper and Silent Auction is our primary fundraiser for the year. All proceeds from the event are used to provide things beyond music and instruments for the Orchestra such as camp and private lesson scholarships, trips, awards, concert receptions, and other incidentals and incentives. "La Fiesta Orquesta" features all Conway orchestra students in a relaxed, family-friendly setting. We serve a meal to over 1,000 people in a single night, in addition to hosting the concerts and silent auction. The concert itself is free, while tickets for the meal may be purchased in advance or at the door. We will need lots of parental help both prior to the Taco Supper and during the supper itself (it takes over 100 parent volunteers to pull off a night like this!). Please watch for and return the Taco Supper volunteer form as soon as you receive it. At the high school level, Taco Supper ticket sales are the primary way for students to fundraise all or part of the cost of their Spring orchestra trip (see below). High schoolers are also expected to help with setup and teardown for the event.

<u>PROGRAM AD SALES</u>: Students will have the opportunity to sell ads for our formal concert programs. Local businesses and individuals will be able to purchase space in our program and support the Conway orchestra program. A portion of ad sale revenue will be credited toward the student's trip account. Details will be distributed in class.

OPUS

In musical terms, an opus is a work or composition. For the Conway Public Schools Orchestras, <u>OPUS</u> is <u>Orchestra Parents</u> <u>United in Support</u>, our parent booster organization. OPUS exists to ensure our students receive the full benefit of their orchestra experience, providing support to the directors as well as financial oversight. Quite simply, this is achieved by the volunteer efforts of parents like you working in concert with the orchestra teachers and other equally dedicated parents. Volunteering at all-region, setting up at concert receptions, and assisting at Taco Supper go a long way to the continued success of the orchestra program. Our OPUS Board will provide several opportunities through the year for you to get involved. Orchestra is a wonderful and enriching experience for our children not only as musicians, but also as young adults, and they will carry it with them long after they graduate from High School. Through the dedication of their teachers and most importantly, YOU THE PARENTS, the Conway Orchestra Program will continue to be a positive, strong, and successful experience for our children.

CHS CHAMBER ORCHESTRA

By dividing the CHS Orchestra into two performing ensembles, the Chamber Orchestra and the Concert Orchestra, the directors can better target instruction to students at all levels of performance and commitment, as well as offer more opportunities for student leadership with two ensembles. Exact details about audition dates and material will be given out in the first few weeks of school. All students will audition as part of their grade. The decision of the directors as to membership in the group will be final. Membership in the Chamber Orchestra is a privilege and is based on performance ability as well as rehearsal etiquette and demonstrated work ethic, not seniority. The Chamber and Concert Orchestras will begin to meet as separate ensembles in early Fall and will continue to perform some concerts and works together throughout the year, at the directors' discretion. Failure of Chamber Orchestra members to maintain a high standard of musicianship and/or attend rehearsals and performances may result in removal from the Chamber Orchestra.

SEATING SYSTEM AND CHAIR ORDER

Every orchestra class is a mix of students with a wide variety of ability and commitment levels. In this program, every student is expected to play to the best of their individual ability and commitment, where each is a valued member of the team and contributes to the overall success of the orchestra.

Competitive ranked seating creates a situation where "many lose in order for a few to win." The Conway Orchestra program has a tradition of replacing hostile competition between peers with a team-oriented mindset. For this purpose, a flexible seating system will typically be used, just as many college and professional orchestras do. This allows the orchestra to sound its best by placing strong players all around the ensemble, not just in stands closest to the conductor. This approach satisfies both the competitive and the non-competitive student. Strong players who are very serious about orchestra are given the opportunity to lead their section and their peers around them by their example. Students are typically seated in non-hierarchical order in complementary pairs, which allows them to learn from each other.

Every student is given the opportunity to give a significant contribution to their group because their importance is not attached to a chair. Because our students understand that the success of each individual contributes to the success of the group, the students themselves foster an environment where they help each other succeed. Section leaders with advanced playing skills should keep in mind that maturity, behavior, and leadership skills are also considered in the selection and seating process. Seniority is not a consideration for seating.

EXTRA PERFORMANCE OPPORTUNITIES

Conway High School Orchestra students have the opportunity to perform in the following extracurricular events and ensembles, which will also count toward earning awards at the end of the school year.

SOUTH REGION ORCHESTRA: An ensemble of students who audition from the southern half of Arkansas. Consists of a Saturday audition in the fall, with the clinic occurring on Friday and all day Saturday one to two weeks later. Participants in the South Region Orchestra are expected to audition for the Arkansas All-State Orchestra.

<u>ALL-STATE ORCHESTRA:</u> Members of the South and North Region Orchestras are re-auditioned the first Saturday in February. Students selected to participate are bused to the Hot Springs Convention Center to participate in rehearsals and perform a final concert on the following Saturday afternoon in conjunction with the ASBOA Convention and All-State bands and choirs. Hotel expenses and a meal stipend are paid by the Music Department. All-State is the highest honor a string player can earn in Arkansas!

<u>SOLO AND ENSEMBLE FESTIVAL</u>: In the Spring of each year, individuals and small groups of students perform prepared accompanied solos and chamber music before a judge who rates it from I - V. Award medals are presented for ratings of superior (I) and excellent (II). The judge's comment sheets are given to all participants.

ARKANSAS SYMPHONY YOUTH ENSEMBLES: Students can audition for and participate in the Arkansas Symphony Academy and Youth Orchestras in Little Rock, sponsored by the Arkansas Symphony Orchestra. Both of these groups utilize winds, brass, and percussion as well. The Youth Ensembles do offer scholarships for tuition. For more information and to set up an audition time, please visit arkansassymphony.org.

<u>SUMMER STRING CAMPS</u>: There are several summer string programs around the state that provide a wonderful experience for all of our students. Intensive work on Region audition music, ensembles, and sectionals with master teachers provide an enriching experience and encourage students to advance their playing. The Conway Orchestra program also awards a

limited number of **camp scholarships** to help defray some of the cost. Scholarship applications will be available in late April or early May, along with details about each camp.

AWARDS

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Students have the opportunity to earn the following awards each year:

- ORCHESTRA LETTERS: for students who earned at least 8 points for the first time in the Conway High School Orchestra.
- HONOR BARS AND CERTIFICATES: for students who earned at least 8 points and already have their letters.
- SENIOR PLAQUE: presented to all graduating seniors in recognition of their commitment to the orchestra program.
- <u>OUTSTANDING MUSICIAN AWARD</u> (pin and certificate): given at the discretion of the directors to a student in each grade level who shows a strong positive and professional influence on the orchestra.
- <u>DIRECTOR'S AWARD FOR ORCHESTRA</u>: presented to the graduating senior who best represents the orchestra based on fulfillment of the Honor Bar qualifications, professional attitude, and positive contribution to the orchestra, as decided by the members of the CHS Orchestra. It consists of an individual engraved plaque as well as a permanent wall plaque for the orchestra room with each recipient's name.
- <u>NATIONAL SCHOOL ORCHESTRA AWARD</u>: presented to the graduating senior who best represents the orchestra based on fulfillment of the Honor Bar qualifications, professional attitude, and positive contribution to the orchestra, as decided by members of the CHS Orchestra. It consists of a permanent wall plaque for the orchestra room with each recipient's name, as well as a pin, certificate, and engraved desk piece for the recipient.
- JAMIE LEA STANTON MEMORIAL AWARD: presented to a graduating senior who, in the opinion of the directors, best
 preserves Jamie's memory by reflecting her ability to get along with everyone, volunteer when help is needed, and
 play to the utmost of her ability while a member of the orchestra.
- <u>KEITH MULBERRY MEMORIAL AWARD</u>: presented to a graduating senior who, in the opinion of the directors, best preserves Keith's memory through his dedication to the orchestra, love of music, and lively, energetic, and fun-loving spirit.
- <u>LEGACY OF MUSIC SCHOLARSHIP</u>: presented to a graduating senior who is planning to major or minor in music in college. This scholarship was established in honor of Mrs. Fournier and Mrs. Winter, long-time orchestra teachers in Conway, whose passion and dedication to the orchestra program during their tenure were transformative.

SCHOLASTIC INELIGIBILITY, FAILURE TO ATTEND REQUIRED REHEARSALS OR PERFORMANCES, OR NOT MAINTAINING A HIGH STANDARD OF PROFESSIONAL DEMEANOR MAY RESULT IN A STUDENT NOT RECEIVING AN AWARD.

CHS ORCHESTRA SPRING TRIP

The CHS Orchestra competes in an out-of-state adjudicated festival in the Spring of each school year. All students are encouraged to attend the trip, as we are a team that relies on the entire group in order to be successful. Students are given the opportunity to sell program ads and "La Fiesta Orquesta" Taco Supper tickets to fundraise all or part of the cost of their trip. A letter of intent detailing the student's account balance, including funds raised, will be sent home so students are aware of their financial obligation for the trip. This must be returned signed by a parent or guardian, regardless of intent to attend the trip. Payment plans and itinerary details will be communicated at a later date. Scholastic eligibility for participation in the trip is consistent with the current Arkansas Activities Association (AAA) Guidelines (see above). In addition, students must have no unexcused absences or disciplinary action that results in suspension.

THE TRIP IS A PRIVILEGE, NOT A RIGHT. STUDENTS WHO ARE ACADEMICALLY INELIGIBLE OR HAVE BEEN SUBJECT TO DISCIPLINARY ACTION BY THE SCHOOL MAY NOT BE PERMITTED TO ATTEND THE TRIP. ALL SCHOOL RULES APPLY ON OVERNIGHT TRIPS. SERIOUS VIOLATIONS OF THE RULES WILL RESULT IN STUDENTS BEING SENT HOME IMMEDIATELY AND AT THEIR OWN COST.

OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION

INSTRUMENT CARE:

- DO NOT ATTEMPT TO FIX AN INSTRUMENT YOURSELF!!! Bring it to school to be evaluated by a teacher.
- Loosen the bow hair and wipe off any rosin dust after playing.
- Avoid extremes of temperature and temperature changes.
- Be extremely careful of banging instruments into things when transporting. Also, do not put weight on the instrument!!
- Extra strings, rosin, and other supplies are available from your orchestra director at cost. Your director will let you know the price of each item.
- An orchestra teacher can usually handle small repairs (broken strings or fallen bridges) at school for the cost of the replacement part. Please DO NOT take your instrument to a shop for a broken string!!!

INSTRUMENT UPGRADES: Students should consider upgrading the quality of their instruments and bows by the beginning of the 10th grade, if not sooner. At the very least, all high school orchestra members should have replaced beginner-level steel strings with Dominant strings or their equivalent. Students are encouraged to progress to higher quality instruments for a more mature tone. Additionally, bows should be upgraded to help improve the tone quality and technical refinement available to the student. Strings should be replaced yearly and bows should be rehaired at least every two years. For suggestions on where to find these items, contact an orchestra teacher.

PRIVATE LESSONS: Private lessons are strongly recommended for all Conway Orchestra students because they allow students to progress at their own pace and to work on solo and technical repertoire that will increase their individual skill level. Almost all Conway High School students who have been awarded college music scholarships have studied privately during their public school days. Many highly-qualified teachers live in the area, including many Arkansas Symphony musicians. Please request a list of private teachers any time during the year.

Limited funds are also available for partial **private lesson scholarships**, based on financial need as well as demonstrated work ethic and merit. Scholarship funds are paid directly to the private teacher on the student's behalf. An application is available at any time from your child's teacher.

<u>SENIOR SOLOS</u>: Any senior who is currently enrolled in private lessons and has been a member of the All-State Orchestra has the opportunity to perform a solo on one of the concerts. They should discuss repertoire selection with their private teacher and orchestra director during the spring of their junior year to make sure it is appropriate and that the orchestral accompaniment is available. They may be asked to play it for approval by early fall of their senior year.

CADET PROGRAM: The Cadet Program serves as a vehicle to provide younger string students with individual tutoring by advanced high school students. Selection of tutors will be based on the following criteria: current Conway Orchestra member, studying with a private teacher, member of All-State Orchestra, and a positive influence on the orchestra program in the Conway Schools. Eligible students will be notified of their acceptance as Cadet Teachers in the spring of each year.

<u>GO TO CONCERTS!</u> Students need to know you think that they and their membership and success in orchestra are important. One way you can show this is by attending their concerts throughout their school music careers. Even the high school students need to have someone in the audience that is there just for them! Out of respect for the performers, please stay for the entire concert – no one likes playing for an empty house!

It's also important for students to have role models and examples to look to. Attending a symphony concert as an audience member is a great family activity and a way for student musicians to broaden their exposure to music and learn so much from watching and hearing professionals perform. We have two wonderful orchestras in the area!

Arkansas Symphony Orchestra: Performances are at the historic Robinson Center Music Hall in Little Rock. Student tickets are free on Sunday afternoons with a paying adult!!! Visit arkansassymphony.org for details.
